Dr. González de Bustamante received her Ph.D. in history at the University of Arizona. Her research interests include: the history of news media in Mexico, Brazil, and the U.S./Mexico borderlands. Her work has been published in *Journalism: Theory, Practice and Criticism*, *Mexican Studies/Estudios Mexicanos*, and *Studies in Latin American Popular Culture*. She is the author of "[Muy buenas noches,](#)" *Mexico, Television and the Cold War* (Lincoln: University of Nebraska Press, 2012), and the co-editor of an anthology about immigration, media and globalization entitled [Arizona Firestorm: Global Immigration Realities, National Media, and Provincial Politics](#) (New York: Rowman and Littlefield, 2012).
